Most Important Problems facing New Zealand in 2017 are Housing related, but the World faces Economic and War & Terrorism problems in almost equal measure according to New Zealanders

In January 2017 **Government/ Public Policy/ Housing issues** are still clearly the most important problems facing **New Zealand** according to New Zealanders. A massive 41% of respondents (up 1% since October 2016) mention these issues. Within this bundle of concerns Housing affordability/ Increasing house prices (15%) and Housing shortage/ Homelessness (11%) are the most prominent.

Prime Minister Bill English has announced the New Zealand Election will be held on Saturday September 23 – almost three years to the day since former Prime Minister John Key led National to its last election victory. Today's survey results show that if English is to secure an election victory later this year he will have to convince New Zealanders he has worthwhile policy solutions to the 'Housing Crisis' facing many electors.

Economic issues 27% (up 2%) are considered the biggest problem facing the **World**, just ahead of War & Terrorism/ Security/ Refugee Crisis issues 26% (down 4%) according to the latest Roy Morgan NZ survey conducted in January 2017 with a representative cross-sample of 1,000 New Zealanders.

New Zealand views on Problems facing New Zealand

When asked about the most important problem facing **New Zealand**, 41% of New Zealanders mention some kind of Government/ Public Policy/ Housing issue. This is up 1% from October 2016 and is still well ahead of Economic issues 30% (down 1%), Social issues 12% (down 3%) and Environmental issues 8% (up 4%).

In terms of Government/ Public policy/ Housing issues a large number of New Zealanders (26%) mention Housing as a major problem – 15% (down 2%) mention Increasing house prices/ Housing affordability and a further 11% (up 1%) mention the Homeless/ Homelessness/ Housing shortage. These issues are well ahead of other issues including Government/ Politicians/ Leadership/ Government Spending 6% (unchanged) and Immigration/ Refugees 4% (unchanged).

The most important Economic issue facing **New Zealand** is Poverty / The gap between the rich and poor 17% (up 1%) ahead of Economy/ Financial crisis/ Recession/ High Dollar 4% (unchanged), Unemployment/ Job security 3% (down 2%) and Cost of living/ Inflation/ Financial hardship 3% (unchanged).

New Zealand's 'Housing Crisis'

Men (17%) regard House prices/ Housing affordability as a greater problem than Women (14%) while this is reversed for the Homeless/ Homelessness/ Housing shortage: Women (13%) cf. Men (8%).

New Zealand's largest city is clearly most heavily impacted by the Housing crisis with 32% of Auckland residents mentioning either Increasing house prices/ Housing affordability (20%) or the Homeless/ Homelessness/ Housing shortage (12%). Auckland is clearly ahead of the next highest region – the South Island outside Christchurch – a total of 28%; Increasing house prices/ Housing affordability (13%) and the Homeless/ Homelessness/ Housing shortage (15%).

New Zealand views on Problems facing the World

The biggest **World** problems are now Economic issues 27% (up 2% since October 2016). The key Economic issues facing the **World** mentioned most often by New Zealanders are Poverty/ The gap between rich & poor/ Imbalance of wealth 15% (up 2%), the Economy/ Financial crisis/ Recession 4% (unchanged), Overpopulation 4% (up 1%) and Cost of living/ Inflation/ Financial hardship/ Household debt 3% (down 1%).

Just behind are the next biggest set of **World** problems which are War & Terrorism/Security issues / Refugee Crisis 26% (down 4% since October 2016). Within that group New Zealanders most frequently mention Terrorism 11% (up 2%), Wars & Conflicts/ Unrest 9% (down 5%) and Religion/ Religious Conflict 3% (up 1%).

Other important **World** problems mentioned are Climate change/ Global warming/ Ozone layer/ Greenhouse effect 9% (up 2%), Donald Trump 7% (new), Social apathy/ Lack of values/ Lack of empathy towards others/ Intolerance 6% (down 1%) and Government/ Politicians/ Political Unrest 5% (down 3%).

Comments made by New Zealanders about the World Economy

"The economy – especially because of oil and gas, the prices will be going up."

"Economic instability – part of the global market, when one goes down it takes everyone else with it."

"The amount and extent of debt in the world."

"Unemployment - no jobs, no money."

"Increase in costs because of Oil and Gas prices."

"Low income families living below the poverty line."

"Global economy."

"Financial Uncertainty."

"The financial crisis never went away, rise in petrol prices inflate the cost of everything else."

"World economies not stable."

"Globalisation – Rich getting richer and poor getting poorer."

"Global trade – the Chinese are the manufacturer of everything."

"The over valuation of the stock market."

"The economy – It's harder to get a job, harder to buy food, harder to buy a house."

"Economics – funding of health care and education on a global level – or the lack of funding of them."

"Donald Trump because he's a dickhead and he's in a position of power."

"First the war in Syria and then Donald Trump and all the trouble he is going to cause the world."

Michele Levine, Chief Executive Officer, Roy Morgan says:

"New Zealand's 'Housing Crisis' – mentioned by 26% (down 1% since October) of New Zealanders 15% (Housing affordability/ Increasing house prices) and 11% (Housing shortage/ Homelessness) as the biggest problem facing **New Zealand** in January looks set to be the key issue for New Zealand electors heading towards this year's election – and we have covered New Zealand's 'Housing Crisis' extensively in a separate release: 'Housing Crisis dominates domestic issues as PM announces Election date'.

"The New Zealand Election is now just under seven months away, on Saturday September 23, 2017, and all indications are that National under new Prime Minister Bill English will win re-election for a fourth term. Today's latest New Zealand Roy Morgan Poll shows National (48%) well ahead of a combined Labour/ Greens coalition (39%) and New Zealand First at 8% not enough for the Opposition to win.

"In addition to the 'Housing Crisis', other key issues mentioned by respondents include Poverty/ The gap between the rich and the poor/ Imbalance of wealth (17%), Government/ Politicians/ Leadership/ Government spending (6%) and Immigration/ Refugees (4%), Economy/ Financial crisis/ Recession/ High dollar 4%), Cost of Living/ Inflation/ Financial hardship (3%) and Unemployment/ Job security (3%).

"Only 12% (down 3%) of New Zealanders mentioned Social issues and just 8% (up 4%) mentioned Environmental issues like Climate change/ Global warming 2% (up 1%) – although it should be noted that this surveying was conducted before the recent Christchurch bushfires.

"For the first time since June 2015, nearly two years ago, New Zealanders nominate Economic issues 27% (up 2%) as the biggest problems facing the **World** now just ahead of War & Terrorism/ Security/ Refugee Crisis issues 26% (down 4%).

"A further 15% (up 3%) mention Environmental issues and 13% (up 3%) mention Government/ Public Policy/ Human Rights issues which for the first time includes a new category for the new US President Donald Trump – himself mentioned by 7% of respondents as the biggest problem facing the World.

"The biggest Economic issue mentioned Is Poverty/ The gap between the rich and poor/ Imbalance of wealth 15% (up 1%) ahead of the Economy/ Financial crisis/ Recession 4% (unchanged) and Overpopulation 4% (up 1%) while Terrorism 11% (up 2%) is now considered a slightly bigger problem than Wars & Conflicts/ Unrest 9% (down 5%). Clearly the most prominent Environmental issue is Climate Change/ Global Warming/ Greenhouse Effect/ Ozone layer 9% (up 2%)."


These findings come from a special New Zealand Roy Morgan survey conducted with New Zealanders aged 14+ asked what are the most important issues facing **New Zealand** and the **World** today.


In New Zealand, a cross-section of 1,000 men and women aged 14 or over were interviewed by telephone in January 2017. Respondents were asked: "Firstly, what do you think is the most important problem facing the World today?" and "What do you think is the most important problem facing New Zealand today?" The research conducted was both qualitative (in that people were asked to use their own words) and quantitative (in that the 'open-ended' responses were analysed and 'coded' so that the results could be counted and reported as percentages).

Margin of Error

The margin of error to be allowed for in any estimate depends mainly on the number of interviews on which it is based. The following table gives indications of the likely range within which estimates would be 95% likely to fall, expressed as the number of percentage points above or below the actual estimate. The figures are approximate and for general guidance only, and assume a simple random sample. Allowance for design effects (such as stratification and weighting) should be made as appropriate.
